## P.Oxy. 8.1077: Further Reflections on a 'Magical' Artifact



This presentation will focus on the intersection of biblical text, inscribed image, material artifact, and ritual performance on a late-antique parchment manuscript (P.Oxy. 8.1077). In addition to analyzing these features, this paper will also address the prevailing scholarly assumption that this object was unequivocally designed to be a healing amulet – an assumption that has recently been questioned (Arzt-Grabner and de Troyer 2018). Through this two-fold analysis, the presentation aims to bring greater clarity to the original meaning and function of this particular artifact and to the classification of non-continuous biblical manuscripts more generally.

Joseph Sanzo is a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Ludwig-Maximilians-Universität München. He holds a Ph.D. in History from the University of California, Los Angeles (2012). Joseph is the author of *Scriptural Incipits on Amulets from Late Antique Egypt: Text, Typology, and Theory* (Tübingen: Mohr Siebeck, 2014) and the coeditor of three scholarly volumes on issues related to ancient magic, late antique book culture, and sacredness during late antiquity. He also has also published his research in several peer-reviewed journals, including *The Harvard Theological Review, The Journal of Theological Studies, The Journal of Early Christian Studies, Vigiliae Christianae, Henoch*, and *Zeitschrift für Papyrologie und Epigraphik*. Joseph is currently working on a book that bridges the fields of early Christian studies and ancient magical studies.
